Today's Program

Our own **Dillon Dougherty** was our program speaker today, sharing with us his 'Golf Story'. Originally scheduled to speak on April 3rd, he agreed to move it up when another program scheduled for today was not able to make it due to illness.



Dillon was born & raised in Woodland. The Doughertys were members of the Yolo Fliers Club, so he got his start in golf early in life, about age 3 or 4. The game came naturally to him and he loved to play. When his family visited La Quinta California, Dillon's grandfather took him to the Citrus Golf Club where he introduced Dillon to **Lee Trevino**, one of the best golfers in the world at that time. Trevino agreed to watch the youngster take a few swings. Later the same day Dillon watched Trevino hit some practice putts, and confidently offered to give Trevino a putting lesson because, Dillon said, Trevino needed some help!

Dillon played in his first golf tournament at age 9, at the Peter Hay Golf Course in Monterey. He shot 2 or 3 under par, and won!

At age 13, Dillon said he made a commitment to practice golf daily so that he could eventually pursue a college scholarship with his skills. By age 15 he was playing so well in high school (Woodland High) that his grandfather took him to play a round of golf with **Bob Rosberg**, a legendary golfer, TV commentator, and teaching professional in Southern California, to evaluate him. They played a round of golf together at the Plantation Club. Dillon started nervously, but eventually scored a 67 at the difficult course. Rosberg declared Dillon to be the second best 15-year old golfer he had ever seen, behind only **Sergio Garcia**, who later became and remains a very successful golf professional.

Following a 2001 graduation from Woodland High School, Dillon got his college scholarship to Northwestern University in Illinois. He joined other successful student golfers there, including Anthony Kim, Ryan Moore and Luke Donald. It was golf 'sun up to sun down' for Dillon at the time and he loved it. He was very successful, particularly in 2005 when he finished near the top in several amateur golfing tournaments. In particular, he reached the finals of the United States Amateur Championship held at the Merion Golf Club near Philadelphia PA that year. Though he lost in the finals, he had earned invitations to play in the Masters and United States Open the following year.

The 2006 **Masters** and **United States Open** were very special for Dillon, especially since he had his father Dan with him as his caddie. For the Masters he was able to play many practice rounds before the event at the famous Augusta National Golf Club course in Augusta, GA. He stayed in the 'Crow's Nest' on the property during the event with other Masters amateurs. At the tournament he met, spent time with and played with former Masters champions like Tom Watson, Vijay Singh, and Gary Player. He shared a number of stories from that experience. The US Open at Winged Foot was a very difficult course, and Dillon admitted he was not at his best, even though he shot an impressive 75 on his final round of the tournament.

His success at that time got him ranked among the top 5 amateur golfers in the world. He decided to turn professional in 2006, the year he graduated from

Northwestern. The start of his professional career was difficult. He tore a tendon in his left foot in 2007 which led him to struggle. He didn't return to top form until 2011. He finished second on the money list of the now-defunct **National Pro Golf Tour** in both 2012 and 2013, but had difficulty competing successfully in the yearend 'Q School', which, at that time, was the tournament used to determine who would get invited to play on the PGA Tour. After finishing just one shot short of getting his PGA card in the 2013 Q School, Dillon decided it was time to end his professional golf career.

Dillon credits the guidance he received growing up locally from Bob Badger, Doug Caldwell and Carl Welty with much of the skills he developed in golf. He doesn't look back, but gets his enjoyment from golf these days in games with his friends and with his father. In 2015 went to work for Morgan Stanley Investments. Still a member of the Fliers Club, he and wife Jenna, and their four children, make their home in Woodland. He became a member of the Rotary Club of Woodland in 2016, and says he enjoys being a Rotarian.
