Today's Meeting




President Shawn Seyk opened today's meeting without any rainfall and the sun attempting to make an

Today's Program



Our guest speaker today was **Craig McNamara**, owner of Sierra Orchards, outside of Winters in Solano County, which


produces mostly organic walnuts and is recognized for its use of its regenerative and sustainable practices,

and conservation techniques. However, **Craig** is also the youngest child and only son of Robert McNamara who served as Defense Secretary for Presidents John

Kennedy and Lyndon Johnson. Craig wrote a book 'Because Our Fathers Lied' which was published last May. He gave us a presentation on that subject.

The Washington Post gave this summary about Because Our Fathers Lied, 'Craig McNamara came of age in the political tumult and upheaval of the late '60s. While Craig would grow up to take part in anti-war demonstrations, his father, Robert McNamara... worked as the architect of the Vietnam War. This searching and revealing memoir offers an intimate picture of one father and son at a pivotal period in American history.





Before Robert McNamara joined Kennedy's cabinet, he was an executive who helped turn around Ford Motor Company. Known for his tremendous competence and professionalism, McNamara came to symbolize "the best and the brightest." Craig...struggled in his father's shadow. When he ultimately fails his draft board physical, Craig decides to travel by motorcycle across Central and South America, learning more about the art of agriculture and making what he defines as an honest living. By the book's conclusion, Craig McNamara is

farming walnuts in Northern California and coming to terms with his father's legacy.'

Craig opened by saying he was honored to join us today. He has many friends in the room, and respected Yolo County support for regenerative practices and sustainable agriculture.

Craig was born in Ann Arbor MI in 1950 and came from a family with deep roots in California as the first McNamaras arrived in California during the Civil War. Craig said his family often took him to the Sierra Nevada when he was young which exposed him to nature and eventually led to him becoming a farmer. He earned a BS degree from UC Davis. Later in 2001, he founded and served as President of the Center for Land Based Learning, now headquartered in Woodland.

The provocative title of his book comes from 'The Epitaphs of the War', a collection of writings by **Rudyard Kipling** regarding World War I (The Great War) in which his own son was lost. 'If any question why we died Tell them, because our fathers lied.'

Craig told the story of living as a 13-year-old with his family in Washington DC in 1964 and one day his father receives a phone call at home from President Johnson. Eventually it would lead to the whole family driving to the White House to meet with the President and Lady Bird Johnson. His father spoke to the President while Craig floated in the White House pool. A few days later Craig received a thank you

letter from the President. A few weeks later Robert McNamara traveled to Vietnam.

Craig asked who in the room had participated in the war. Gary Wegener and George Burger were both in the U.S. Navy at that time. He noted 2.7 million Americans would serve in the Vietnam War; 55,000 of those were killed; over 55 million Vietnamese were killed; and 7.5 million tons of bombs were dropped by the United States during the war (more than 3 times as many as were dropped in all of World War II). Craig said his early adult life was lived through that lens of the war. Craig said his heart was broken and lost confidence in his country. He became an active anti-war protester. He would eventually drop out of college (Stanford) and traveled outside of the United States for three years.

In the prologue of his book Craig wrote, "Just tell me the truth. Seems simple enough. Yet for all of my life, I struggled to arrive at the truth with my father. He never told me that he knew the Vietnam War was not winnable. But he did know, and he never admitted it to me. I still wonder why he was no more honest with me than he was with the American public."

Robert McNamara wrote a memoir in 1994 admitting he was wrong in not admitting the war was not winnable during his time in the cabinet but made no apology for his role in causing so much death in the war. He died in 2009.

Craig wanted to do something for all the United States troops who had participated in the war, and for the Vietnamese. 'What can we do together to move

on' he asked himself. He worked with his wife Julie at researching his father. In 2017 they traveled to Vietnam and found the people there very friendly.

Craig answered several questions. Thanks to Jim Nolan for arranging and introducing this excellent program.
