President Bob Nakken opened the meeting with a **'Happy Tax Day'** greeting and got us going on the Pledge of Allegiance. Our team of


Jordi Richter, Dan Stroski and Steve Venables led a spirited Rotary Grace.

Today's Program



Our guest speaker today was **Ryan Kinnan**, Police Chief, City of Woodland. Woodland Fire Chief **Eric Zane** had the honors of introducing **Ryan**, who was appointed to his current position as Chief in October 2024 after serving as Police Chief in the City of Auburn since 2018.

Chief Kinnan is originally from Ventura County CA. He served four years in the Marine Corp, service which included jumping out of helicopters. In 2006 he began a career in local law enforcement when he joined the police force in the new city of Citrus Heights, eventually achieving the rank of Lieutenant. Of being a police officer, he said 'every day is different, you get to drive fast and catch bad guys', at least until you hold a desk job, as he calls his current role. He holds a



Master of Public Administration, a Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice and he is a graduate of the FBI National Academy. **Ryan** is married and has four children, ranging in age from 15-23 years.

Staffing is a concern for **Chief Kinnan**. The Woodland police force has 72 (sworn) positions currently budgeted, but 6 of those are vacant, awaiting replacements. The Department had more budgeted positions in 2008 when the city had nearly 10,000 fewer residents. Most of his budgeted positions are assigned to patrol services. With 15 square miles in which to provide service, having to provide services around the clock, shift strength is thin. 'We have 4 officers on the street right now', said **Ryan**. You go where the calls are, but you cannot be everywhere. To set staffing schedules that are effective in meeting the community's safety needs, the Department must monitor reliable information closely and plan strategically.

Staff turnover is steady. This year they anticipate 5 retirements alone. Recruiting and hiring new officers takes about six months. Each officer hired then goes through about a year of training, both in attending the police academy and going through field training under the guidance of a field training officer before they are qualified to serve on their own. To achieve their goal of reaching 100% staffing levels by the end of 2026 **Chief Kinnan** says they must actively engage in training and promotions. He pointed out that every time an officer arrests someone and takes them to the County jail, the officer must spend 2-3 hours at the jail to do the paperwork before he can return to service back on the street. **Ryan** says the



Department is looking to make more utilization of reserve officers to minimize the time officers spend on this booking process.

Homelessness remains a concern for the community at large, as well as the police force. Chief Kinnan reported Woodland has about 250 chronically homeless people living in town currently. About 46% of our homeless population have some family ties (grew up in or have family living here) to Woodland, as opposed to people who came to Woodland from elsewhere. Ryan went on to say nearly 50% of our homeless population have been living on the streets for more than 7

years. The Woodland Police Department remains an active partner of the HOST team (which stands for homeless, outreach, street team) along with County health and human services agencies personnel who actively engage our homeless population to offer services, enforce camping restrictions and clean up public sites. Typical of the Spring season, **Ryan** says the current effort is to make sure weed abatement takes place to remove places homeless camps can hide in.

Chief Kinnan spoke about the community's gang activity which remains a problem. A few years ago, Woodland experienced one year in which 50 shootings took place. Several of the offenders were sentenced to jail, and recent years saw a reduction to an average of about 10-15 shootings annually. **Ryan** says the community is currently seeing an increase in retaliation activity by gang members, often displayed in the form of gang graffiti throughout the community. **Chief Kinnan** is asking citizens to report any unexpected graffiti they see so the Department can respond to them accordingly and advance efforts for peace among the gangs.

Chief Kinnan responded to several questions posed by Club members. **Ryan** says the City's Code Enforcement team in the Community Development Department is handling problems with unlicensed vendors popping up at various locations around the community. When asked to compare California law enforcement officers with those in other states, **Chief Kinnan** remarked the focus professional standards for the police in California generally make this state's police officers better at their work than most officers in other states.
