Jim Nolan introduced Becky Heard, Director of Development and Community Relations for Yolo Crises Nursery Homepage - Yolo Crisis Nursery

Yolo Crisis Nursery is based in Davis and serves all of Yolo County. They began in 2001 after seeing the need for emergency care for children and families in crisis. They are open 24 hours a day 365 days a year and all services are free of charge.



The mission of Yolo Crisis Nursery is to provide early intervention services in a safe environment to nurture healthy and resilient children, strengthen parents and preserve families.

Protecting children is at the heart of what they do, and they want to do more. They help kids thrive and become resilient in the face of traumatic experiences. They fulfill their mission and achieve their vision through the Nursery's signature programs: Crisis Overnight and Respite Care, Wraparound Services for Families, and Specialized Infant Day Care and Preschool.

Since 2001 the organization has served over 11,500 children.

During 2024-2025 they provided:

- 2,894 Safe Stays for at-risk children
- 5,601 Care Packages distributed to the community
- 1,369 Children were served last year by the Nursery
- Growth in every Yolo Crisis Nursery Program

In 2023, after many years working from a 1400 square foot house, and after several years of planning and raising funds, they moved into a beautiful new facility in Davis which has enabled them to grow their programs and have a larger impact on Yolo County families. They are one of only four nurseries in the entire state of California.

The Rotary Club of Woodland donated \$10,000 towards the new facility.

In addition to crisis care for children, they also provide wrap-around services for the entire family including support



and guidance for parents and referrals to community services. They also provide employment support (resume prep, interview practice and even interview clothing and haircuts).
